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## Industrial Districting Law is Called Illegal. FIGHT "ZONING" IN COURTS.

Wilshire Residents Organize in Effort to Have Ordinances Found Illegal.

Property owners and business men who are opposed to the socalied "roning" ordinances which restrict large areas of the city to residences and create a monopoly in favor of those business establishments already located inside of these districts, have organized to bring the entire matter in the courts, where they are confident the legislation will be set aside as unconstitutional.

The Wilshire, Improvement Asso--clation has been formed with Judge Charles F. Crail as president; William II. Akin, vice-president; Ernest Becker, Jr., secretary, and S. J. Chapman, treasurer. These officers. with II R. Kells, H. H. Belden and Arthur Lack, constitute the board of directors, Attorney Milton M. Cothen of the firm of Dominguez, Dehm and Cohen, has been retained as counsel by the association, and he will conduct the fight in the courts in an effort to have the entire list of residence districting ordinances declared illegal.

It is not unlikely that the ordinances will be brought courts as the result of action taken by the City Prosecutor's office in prosecuting owners of business buildings now being built inside of zone No 5, which is the district bounded by Sixth, Seventh and Cataline streets and Vermont avenue. After zone No. 5 amendment to the "zoning" ordinance had been passed by the Council a building permit was issued to A. G. Tiblits to erect one-story business buildings at the southeast corner of Sixth and Berendo streets, to cost \$28,000, and to be occupied as stores. On the 19th inst, the amendment to the "zoning" ordinance bucomes effective, making it liegal to operate now business establishments in this district. giving those inside of the "zone" until 1935 to move.

Councilman Langdon reported to the Council has week that in spite of the amendment, the buildings were being built, and the Council then instructed the City Prosecutor to arrest the owners and prosecute them. It is believed that under the ordinance this cannot be done until the hulldings are completed and the businesr - databilatiments are in actual operation. thay are in operation after June 19, the owners will be arrested for establishing businesses in the district after March 1, 1920, and the case will be fought through to the highest courts.

While City Attorney Burnell will defend the actions in the court. Mr. Burnell said recently that he warned the Council at the time he was directed by that body to draw up the "roning" ordinances that he had grave doubts that the courts would sustain them.
